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<sup>1</sup>For seven hundred years, every king and queen of England was crowned king while sitting on a throne mounted on a large block of limestone. The stone is called the "Stone of Scone." King Edward I (1239-1307) stole the stone from the Scots (it was returned to Scotland in 1997). Scottish tradition held that the stone was the 'pillow' that Jacob rested his head on when he had his dream. It was used as a coronation stone by the early Hebrew kings and was kept in Solomon's Temple in Jerusalem after the destruction of the First Temple in 422 BCE, the stone eventually found its way first to Ireland and later to Scotland, As outrageous as this idea may sound, it shows us the centrality and importance of the Davidic line in history." —[http://www.simpletoremember.com/articles/a/david\\_the\\_king](http://www.simpletoremember.com/articles/a/david_the_king)
