

# HERMENEUTICS 5 THEOLOGICAL & PEDAGOGICAL IMPLICATIONS

PRE 501– Behavioral Objectives

## TO COMPLETE PRE 501 SUCCESSFULLY YOU WILL NEED TO...

- 1. Submit a RESEARCH REPORT covering a significant issue in Scripture interpretation. Part of the assessment of said RESEARCH REPORT will be the degree to which the topic is indeed *significant* and does indeed explore *fully* a theological, pragmatic, or cultural profile associated with a hermeneutical issue. Here are some examples of *significant* topics:
  - ℵ Theological issues
    - ✓ "Regarding the Morality of War: What is the nature of the Lord God as reflected in the Hebrew Scriptures versus the New Testament?"
    - ✓ "Calvinism: Implications for Hermeneutics?"
    - ✓ "Arminianism: Implications for Hermeneutics?"
    - ✓ "What is the theological rationale for hermeneutical approaches to studying Scripture?"

#### ℵ Pragmatic issues—

- ✓ "Which translations of the Scriptures should be used in hermeneutical study of the Bible?"
- ✓ "How does exegesis of Scripture affect hermeneutical analyses of Scripture?"
- ✓ "What are some impractical issues related to a hermeneutical approach to studying Scripture?"
- ℵ Culture issues—
  - "Επιστευον<sup>1</sup>—Why is "episteumon" interpreted as "believe" as in Acts 16:31, yet "faith" as in Luke 7:50?"
  - ✓ "How Western Thought Impacts the Interpretation of Scripture An Examination of Three Significant Examples"
  - ✓ "What obstacles do seminary trained teachers have when using a hermeneutical approach in the local church's Bible study class?"
  - ✓ Hermeneutically speaking, what does the Scripture say which contradicts American values regarding the morality of homosexuality?<sup>2</sup>

- A. The RESEARCH REPORT is limited to 15 pages, with a minimum of 10 pages, excluding title page and bibliography. Appropriate illustrations are welcomed.
- B. RESEARCH REPORTS must be consistent with the principles described and prescribed in the class and its readings, in addition to relevant "technical" specifications (e.g., "doublespaced" in 12 point for text, 10 point for



footnotes, etc.<sup>3</sup>) I accept Arial, Garamond, Palatino, and Times Roman fonts. If you have another favorite font, simply ask for permission to use same.

- C. RESEARCH REPORTS must also conform to specifications addressed in "ADVICE & MISCELLANEOUSLY CRITICAL TIPS FOR WRITING THE WORD."<sup>4</sup> It as your guide for writing in general, and for college/seminary in particular. It is also a required reading for PRE 501. See "Class Texts" listing below.
- D. RESEARCH REPORTS, final version, are due March 11, 10pm (one week after the last class on March 4). Non-graded drafts with professorial feedback will be provided if submitted by March 1.
- 2. Complete a final examination (March 4) covering such topics as the following
  - a) Integrating exegesis and hermeneutics in the interpretation of Scripture.
  - b) Identifying key hermeneutical errors in the interpretation of Scripture.
  - c) When presented an example of hermeneutical error, be able to identify said error and the cause for same.
  - d) Transliterate a New Testament Greek word into phonemic English (e.g., πιστος = pistos).

- 3. Complete all textbook (see below) readings as <u>per affidavit</u>.
