SEVEN PEDAGOGICAL & EPISTEMOLOGICAL RULES FOR SPT101/511

- I. Your faith is based on beliefs that are wrong. Likewise for me, and correspondingly I have learned the more I know, the less I know.
- II. The professor is not correct, always. Neither are you.
- III. We are here to learn more about what we do not know than what we do know. Hubris abounds when what we know begins to supplant humility in learning more about Him.
- IV. If you fail to correct me, then you are not meeting your obligations as a student—the days of “listen, shut up, and tell him what he wants to hear” are over. This is neither the fifth grade nor catechism.
- V. If the professor fails to correct you, he fails. This is neither the fifth grade nor catechism; thick skin¹ was one of our first gifts from the LORD God after spiritual sentience (Genesis 3:21); and, later He noted we all need new skins.²
- VI. Perfect doctrine is not a requisite for soteriological security. Doctrine based on trust not in our knowledge, but in His grace is the doctrine that leads to soteriological sentience and security.
- VII. Questions are the icing of learning; declarative statements, while important, are mere flour. Question, question, question—the key to learning. Remember how the greatest teacher taught? The Christ responded to declarative statements, even those framed as “questions?”
 - 1) “But who do you say I am?”
 - 2) “What does the Scripture say?”
 - 3) “Where are you?”
 - 4) “What good is it for a man to gain the whole world but forfeit his soul?”
